In "eLiteracy for City Civics," McClintock will discuss interactions between digital communications and the educational potentials of life in large cities for both children and adults. Historically cities have been pedagogically suspect, and "urban education," understood as factory schools for the urban poor, has been in a standing crisis. The challenge to eLiteracy is to change all that. McClintock will suggest that digital technologies can enable us to think about education in and through cities in a different, more hopeful way by seeing full participation in urban life as the physical correlate to eLiteracy, fully realized.
